10.35 – 11.30: Discussion of a selection of our novels: Karen Hewitt on one of the new novels, Grace Notes; Rod Mengham on A History of the World in 10 ½ Chapters; Will May on Atonement; Catherine Brown on «Regeneration».

12.-40 - 1.10 p.m.: Rod Mengham will discuss one or two contemporary poems.

2.30 – 3.20: Teachers in groups to discuss the experience of teaching the novels with newcomers to the project; the British participants will move from group to group as requested.

3.20 – 4.10 p.m.: Karen will briefly discuss some new thoughts on «Black Swan Green» and then introduce our other new novel, Sebastian Faulks’ «A Week in December», followed by a discussion of «A Week in December» by Catherine Brown.

4.30 – 5.20: Seminar Exercise on «Accents, Dialects, Sociolects: How authors transcribe them and what they mean». Photocopies of extracts will be circulated.

5-20 – 6.10: Play-reading: Introduction to a play-reading by Will May followed by the reading of the play by the British panel.

6.10: Some participants will be able to collect their books and commentaries – in an order decided by the co-directors.

About the English participants:

Catherine Brown is a Lecturer in English Literature at New College, Oxford. She studied English at Cambridge, before migrating to interests in political science, art history, and Russia. She took an MSc in Russian and Post-Soviet Studies at LSE. Her PhD was on «Anna Karenina», «Daniel Deronda» and «Women in Love». This year she published «The Art of Comparison: How Novels and Critics Compare» (London: Legenda). She is working on a study of the soul in British Modernism.

Rod Mengham is Reader in Modern English Literature at the University of Cambridge. He is the author of books on Charles Dickens, Emily Bronte, Thomas Hardy and Henry Green, as well as of «The Descent of Language» (1993). He has edited collections of essays on contemporary fiction, and is the editor of the Equipage series of poetry pamphlets. His own poems have been published under the titles «Unsung: New and Selected Poems and Parleys and Skirmishes».

Will May is a Lecturer in English at the University of Southampton. Recent publications include «Stevie Smith and Authorship» (Oxford University Press, 2010) and «Postwar Literature: 1950-1990» (Longman, 2010). His current research looks at collaborations between contemporary writers and composers.
